




b) Convergent



c) Transform Plate Boundary








Implemented by:

- characterising resilience through empirical measurements, based upon the principle that resilience affords many benefits to societies and their members.
- understanding how mainstream community/cultural processes influence resilience (based on the premise that people's capacities derive primarily from their everyday life experiences).
- understanding how 'everyday' community competencies and characteristics influence risk, consequences, and the choices people make about how to manage their risk.
- affords opportunities to implement resilience programmes in ways that integrate risk management and community development through community engagement.
